Participation In Government (Credit Recovery)

A diagnostic driven credit recovery course is designed to give an expanded opportunity for students who did not succeed the first time in the course.

Students are given the opportunity in each learning unit to demonstrate their knowledge in that area of study. If they demonstrate competency in their unit assessment they will be presented with the following unit. If they do not demonstrate competency then they are required to do the entire unit.

Requirement:

For a student to take a credit recovery course, they must have already taken the class unsuccessfully and have the appropriate seat time.

Course Description:

This course will guide students through an in-depth study of the history, structure, and guiding principles of American government. The first unit will review the origins of government in general and American government in particular—from the earliest models for democracy to the founding documents that created a federalist system of government in the U.S. Several units will help students explore the roles and responsibilities of each branch of government as well as the impact that the Constitution has had and continues to have on the way government works and on the lives of individual Americans.

Prerequisite: Participation In Government (Student must have taken Participation In Government unsuccessfully and have the appropriate seat time).
